

Lions Quest Assessment FAQs

Does Lions Quest have a Unit Assessment or tool that I can use to show that my students are getting what they need from the lessons?

After the APPLYING section of each Lions Quest lesson, there are instructions for ASSESSING the lesson. The instructions give the implementer the opportunity to administer an Informal Formative Assessment and a Formal Formative Assessment.

Does Lions Quest provide a pre and post assessment so that I can measure how well my students are doing after the program ends?

The Lions Quest Pre and Post Student Survey is a tool designed to be used by implementers and schools to measure the changes in skills and attitudes of students participating in the Lions Quest Program. The survey is an informal tool that covers the students' knowledge of social and emotional learning skills, anti-drug attitudes, as well as their attitudes about school culture.

Does Lions Quest offer a student survey for PreK - 2?

The Lions Quest Student Survey is available for grades 3-12. Our program developers are currently researching appropriate methodologies to provide implementers with a tool to assess Pre K-2. All grade levels include the formative and informal assessments at the end of each lesson.

My grant / district / department of education requires us to have a formal assessment of our implementation of the Lions Quest Program, what can I do?

Depending on the outcomes that you need to measure, there are a variety of national youth surveys and data collection tools that are available to schools, districts, and education departments. In addition to the surveys listed below, many funders may recommend or require participation in state or federally approved youth surveys as part of the grant requirements.

School Climate Surveys

Lions Quests Programs specifically promote a safe and supportive school climate through teacher and administrator training, expanded lesson plans, and community and parent engagement activities.
