Self-reflection

This tool lists 12 strategies that facilitators can use to promote student engagement and interest. Complete this tool at the beginning, middle, and end of the school year to self-assess long term changes in practice.

The Self-Reflection Scale

1.	I have little or no knowledge about this and limited experience in doing this.
2.	I have basic knowledge and some experience, but I have to consult with others to do this effectively.
3.	I have a good understanding of this and can do it effectively.
4.	I can teach others to do this or help them do it.

	Rearrange desks and seats (e.g., I circle, groups, or other collaborative	
	structures) as part of transitioning to the Lions Quest lesson.	
2.	Act as a facilitator rather than an instructor (e.g., facilitators speak 30	
	percent of the time; students speak 70 percent of the time).	
3.	Use a variety of open-ended questions to find out what students already	
	know about the social and emotional skills taught.	
4.	Wait an appropriate amount of time (7-10 seconds) for students to think	
	about and share authentic responses.	
5.	Accept multiple responses and respond respectfully to diverse viewpoints.	
6.	Seek student input about everyday dilemmas and challenges they face to	
	increase motivation to learn.	
7.	Ask "what do you think?" rather than "why?" questions during discussions	
	to open up divergent thinking.	
8.	Include questions and discussions during the direct teaching of skills and	
	concepts.	
9.	Use creative grouping strategies to form small groups for discussion and	
	cooperative group work.	
10.	Emphasize positive energy, fun, and excitement during group work.	
11.	Ask "What" questions about what students did and observed during the	
	classroom activity.	
12.	Ask "So what?" questions that focus on what was important about what	
	they experienced.	
13.	Ask "Now what?" questions that help students integrate or apply their	
	learning.	
14.	Build on the same strategies used throughout the school day to reward	
	student engagement to positively reinforce student participation.
